Senior Reminders

- Do you need to work on your applications, resumes, college essays or scholarships? Sign up in guidance for one of the "Open Sessions". One period a day is devoted to seniors who need time to work on their career/college related materials.
- Type up your resume and have it ready for when you apply for jobs, college and scholarships. Your CareerCruising account has a great resume builder!
- If you plan to take the March SAT you need to ask your guidance counselor to send out your scores to colleges you applied to (unless you had them sent directly from College Board).
- Let your guidance counselor know if you receive any scholarship money.
- Many of you have completed your FAFSA. You may have over looked the information that is required by the state of Pennsylvania in order to access PA State Grant money. GO to

www.pheaa.org. In the middle of the page you will see a box with the words STATE GRANT PROGRAM, click on SECURE SIGN IN, Create an account, complete the few questions you will be asked, print out the signature page (this requires a parent signature and student signature) and send to the address on the signature page.

- DO THIS AS SOON AS POSSIBLE SO YOU CAN ACCESS STATE GRANT MONEY!!!!
- If you want to participate in Division I or Division II sports in college, start the certification process. **NCAA** applications are available in guidance.
- Visit the colleges you have been accepted to before you make your final decision to make sure it is the right fit!
- Accepted into a school? Have a job lined up after graduation? Joining the military? Bring a copy of your acceptance letter/offer to guidance. We will make a copy for you.

Junior Reminders

- Visit colleges you may be interested in. Check for Open Houses in the Spring!
- Set up an account on College Board (www.collegeboard.org). Do the SAT question of the day.
- Register for the SAT/ACT if you plan on attending college.

2017 Advanced Placement Information

- Start to decide upon your intent in regards to taking the AP exam(s). **If you plan to take an AP exam, please let your AP teacher know no later than March 17th 2017.**
- Read the CollegeBoard publication “**Bulletin for AP Students and Parents.**” Students will be required to sign a statement on their AP Exam answer sheet indicating that they are aware of, and agree to, the policies contained in the Bulletin.
- Each exam costs \$93.00. **If you qualify for free/reduced lunch, the exam cost will be \$53.00.** (You will be notified if this changes).
- **Make checks payable to “Western Wayne.”**
- To simplify the process of collecting the fees, students will bring their check- made payable to “Western Wayne”- to the proctor on the day of the exam. Do NOT give your AP teacher the fees yourself and please do not bring your checks or cash to guidance before the day of the exam.
- **If you order an exam, but do not take it, there is a \$15 fee that **you must pay** for us to return the unused exam. Make the check payable to “Western Wayne.”**
- Exams will be given in the district office (remember, it is connected to the H.S. by the math hallway). Breakfast will be offered before the exam in the District Office, but you must be ready to take the exam promptly at 8:00a.m.
- You are expected to be in your regularly scheduled classes following the exam. Be sure to sign in with Mrs. Herzog in the main office when you return.
- If you are taking the Physics 1 or 2 or Computer Science Principles exams, you need to make sure you eat 1st Lunch! An announcement will be made to teachers to let them know. You need to report to the district office immediately after lunch- the exam starts at noon. For all other subjects, you will attend lunch after the exam.
- Bring your own calculator if needed for your particular exam. If you don’t have a calculator, ask your teacher.
- Exam results will be online (through the Collegeboard website) mid-July. A student who receives a score of 3, 4, or 5 will be reimbursed the cost of the exam.
- There are specific reasons for late testing (using an alternate form of the examination). For example, if you have a school-related event (chorus trip or band trip) scheduled on the date of the AP exam(s); you may take an alternate form of the AP exam at an alternate date and time. See Mrs. Gribble if you need late testing. **There is an additional fee of \$45.00 for late testing.** Therefore, the additional \$45.00 late testing fee along with the \$93.00 exam cost will require students to submit a check totaling \$138.00, made payable to “Western Wayne.”

- STEP 1: Click on STUDENTS & PARENTS
- STEP 2: Click on Gradebook-Parent
- STEP 3 Click on ONLINE Registration
- STEP 4: Create a User Name and Password. Click Create Account Information. If a drop down list of schools does not appear, please make this change to your Internet Explorer options. TOOLS, Compatibility Mode, ADD (this website), click close.
- STEP 5: Personal Information Page. Complete this- Identify yourself. Only Parents or Guardians may request a Parent Portal Account. You must be listed as the parent or guardian on your child's emergency card to create the account.
- STEP 6: Connect Your Student to Your Account. List your child's student ID and home address. You may enter multiple siblings from both Middle School and High School.
- STEP 7: Registration is Successful, Waiting for Approval. The registration is reviewed and approved by the building administrator which may take several days. Your approval will be sent via email. The email will contain a LINK to ACTIVATE your account.

The Cloud

From home, students have access to programs/software used in their classrooms. Students connect to a computer within Western Wayne schools to access programs such as Microsoft Office including Word, Excel, PowerPoint, and Publisher. The CLOUD provides students with access to all their school files and documents.

6. A new icon appears on your home computer
7. Steps 1-6 are only necessary one time.

10. THE CLOUD will sense your home printer. Documents saved at school and accessed through THE CLOUD can be printed to your home printer.

This one-year, dual-certificate program combines the Lackawanna College Police Academy with a 16-credit, undergraduate level, environmental semester at the Lackawanna College Environmental Education Center in Covington Township, PA. The CNRO program will prepare students for entry-level Natural Resource Ranger and Interpreter positions in state, county, and municipal park systems. If you are a student with a strong interest in the visual arts, SoVA's High School Summer Art Camp is for you!

"This is a great program for students interested in a career in the arts," said Dr. Natalia Pilato, SoVA alumna and camp coordinator. The camp, *Portfolio Thinking*, will take place June 25 - 30, at the University Park campus. Open to students entering grades 9 through 12 (and just-graduated seniors), the camp will provide an intensive residential studio workshop program across various art media.

SoVA recognizes that not all students with an interest in attending the camp can afford to participate. To help address this we are offering a small number of partial and full-tuition scholarships.

College Applications

What is early action? Early action is the early admission program in which applying early will get you an early answer. This program usually asks students to apply by November 1 and the college responds with a decision by mid-December. However, you are not required to make your decision until the regular May reply date, giving you time to compare financial aid packages between colleges. Early action is non-binding, which means you do not have to attend the college if you are accepted. The advantage of the early action program is that you find out whether you are accepted sooner rather than later, giving you time to enjoy the last few months of your senior year without having to worry about being accepted into college.

What is early decision? Early decision is similar to early action in that you can apply early (usually by November 1) and get an early answer from your college about acceptance (usually around mid-December). However, with early decision, there is a catch. Early decision plans are binding. This means that if you apply to a college via the early decision process, you must attend that college if accepted and offered an adequate financial aid package. Thus, you can only apply to **one** early decision school. You can, however, apply to other colleges under regular admission. If you are accepted by your early decision college, then you must withdraw all other applications. Keep in mind that early decision may not be your best option if you want to compare financial aid packages between colleges. Early decision colleges usually offer students a better chance of admission if they apply early. When you research schools with the early decision option, check out the acceptance rates for students who apply early decision versus regular admission. The early decision acceptance rates are usually higher.

Western Wayne's Procedures for Submitting College Applications



1. **ALL PAPER APPLICATIONS** must be brought to the Guidance Office **ONE WEEK** before the specific college deadline. The Guidance Department will not guarantee meeting college deadlines for applications that are submitted to the Guidance Office late. The entire completed college application packet should be brought to Guidance. This includes the student application, essays, letters of recommendation, Secondary School Report, and application fee. Students applying to a college directly **online** should notify their guidance counselor.
2. Some college/universities will waive the applications fee if you visit their campus. Other colleges/universities have free online college applications. Students having financial difficulties covering the application fee should see their guidance counselor.
3. **TRANSCRIPT REQUEST- CURRENT STUDENTS:** Students must complete an official Western Wayne **TRANSCRIPT REQUEST** form giving permission to send the student's transcript and test scores. Applications are not considered complete without your transcript. **TRANSCRIPT REQUEST** forms are available on the Western Wayne website (under guidance) or on the opening page under Guidance Resources.

The first request you make is **FREE**. All subsequent requests are **\$5.00**. Bring the check, money order, or cash into Mrs. Lombardi in the guidance office. Your transcript will be sent certified. Please allow one week to process transcript requests! **PLAN AHEAD.**

4. **TRANSCRIPT REQUEST- FORMER STUDENTS** Please follow the instructions above. In addition, if **YOU ARE A PREVIOUS STUDENT**, a letter requesting the transcript must be submitted with your signature. The letter can be attached electronically with this request or sent to the Western Wayne Guidance Department, 1970A Easton Turnpike, Lake Ariel, PA 18436. The request will not be processed until the letter is received.
5. Your transcript includes your SAT and ACT scores. Check to make sure guidance has your most up to date scores. A few colleges require that you have your SAT/ACT sent directly from the College Board/ACT program (Penn State is one). It is your responsibility to have the scores sent. Questions...see your guidance counselor.
6. Fee waivers are available for most colleges if you received a fee waiver for the SAT or ACT. See your guidance counselor for an application fee waiver. If you are paying an application fee by check or money order, please bring it to guidance and we will attach it to your transcript. Most colleges allow you to pay by credit card when you complete your application online. Checks and money orders must be made out to the college you are applying to. **DO NOT** pay for college application fees with cash!
7. Students requesting Counselor Letters of Recommendation must request the letter at least **TWO WEEKS** in advance.
8. In most instances, **Early Decision** applications should be submitted around November 1st. This can vary so watch your dates! Regular Decision applications should be submitted as soon as possible. If you are uncertain about application deadlines see your guidance counselor.
9. **Mid-year grades** will be sent to colleges that require them. It is the student's responsibility to notify the guidance office about sending out midyear grades.
10. Final transcripts will be sent to the college that the student will attend. **FINAL TRANSCRIPT REQUESTS** will be given to seniors at the end of the school year. *Remember, college admissions representatives review all senior year grades very carefully.*
