- Do you need to work on your applications, resumes, college essays or scholarships? Sign up for our Guidance Department through our Google Classroom. The Class code is **e275ae5**. Within the classroom you will find links to everything you might need for your 12th grade year and beyond.
- Type up your resume and have it ready for when you apply for jobs, college and scholarships.
- Sign up for the SAT if you need to at <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>. The deadline to register for the SAT on June 3, 2023 is May 4, 2023.
- Visit colleges you are interested in, attend college fairs and open houses. A few places may still hold virtual open houses and tours only.
- Begin applying to colleges. Prepare your application carefully. Follow the instructions and PAY CLOSE ATTENTION TO DEADLINES! Be sure to ask your counselor and teachers **at least two weeks** before your application deadlines to submit the necessary documents to colleges (your transcript, letters of recommendation, etc.).
- Tell your school counselor if you apply to college online... your transcript needs to be sent out. TRANSCRIPT REQUESTS are completed online through the Western Wayne website. You must request a transcript for each college you plan to apply to.

Career Spotlight Financial Advisor



Brief Job Description

Financial advisors meet with clients and counsel them on their finances. This could mean sitting down and creating budgets, firming up retirement plans or giving advice about investing. Financial advisors can also invest a client's funds and meet with them regularly to discuss their investments. Some are also licensed to sell insurance.

Education

Financial advisors usually start their career journey with a Bachelor's degree. Financial advisors often study finance, accounting or another business-related major to prepare for this job, but you can choose from a broad range of degrees. The Certified Financial Planner Certification Examination is required to become a CFP – a distinction that looks good to employers and clients. You'll need a bachelor's degree and you must meet other education and work experience requirements to take the exam. Many financial advisors pursue a master's degree. Areas of study may include finance or business administration.

More Info

Financial Advisors made a median salary of \$94,170 in 2021. The best-paid 25% made \$158,890 that year, while the lowest-paid 25% made \$61,200.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects 15.4% employment growth for financial advisors between 2021 and 2031. In that period, an estimated 50,900 jobs should open up.

The path for how to become a financial advisor requires time investment in your education and in developing your business skills. Those who like to communicate with people, enjoy money management and are strategic problem solvers will definitely feel comfortable in this profession. Although it is a stressful industry because you have to take care of other people's money, it brings with it a fast-paced and rewarding environment.

Shorten Your Path to a College Degree. Western Wayne High School is an ONLINE TESTING SITE for CLEP!!!! What is CLEP? CLEP (College Level Examination Program) is the most widely accepted faster credit-by-examination program in the United States today, helping students of all ages earn college degrees faster by getting credit for what they already know. By receiving a satisfactory score, you can earn from **3 to 12 college credits** toward your college degree for each CLEP you take, depending on the exam subject. SAVE TIME. Get college credit for what you already know. Be rewarded for what you've learned through independent study, advanced high school courses, noncredit adult courses, or professional development. CLEP offers 33 examinations in five subject areas. The tests cover material usually taught in a two-year degree program or in the first two years of a four-year program. Exams contain mainly multiple-choice questions. College Composition and a few other exams contain other types of questions and essays. For a complete list of CLEP tests and to schedule a testing time please see Mr. Fitzsimmons in the school counseling office.

College Applications

What is Early Action?

Early action is the early admission program in which applying early will get you an early answer. This program usually asks students to apply by November 1 and the college responds with a decision by mid-December. However, you are not required to make your decision until the regular May reply date, giving you time to compare financial aid packages between colleges. Early action is non-binding, which means you do not have to attend the college if you are accepted. The advantage of the early action program is that you find out whether you are accepted sooner rather than later, giving you time to enjoy the last few months of your senior year without having to worry about being accepted into college.

What is Early Decision?

Early decision is similar to early action in that you can apply early (usually by November 1) and get an early answer from your college about acceptance (usually around mid-December). However, with early decision, there is a catch. Early decision plans are binding. This means that if you apply to a college via the early decision process, you must attend that college if accepted and offered an adequate financial aid package. Thus, you can only apply to **one** early decision school. You can, however, apply to other colleges under regular admission. If you are accepted by your early decision college, then you must withdraw all other applications. Keep in mind that early decision may not be your best option if you want to compare financial aid packages between colleges. Early decision colleges usually offer students a better chance of admission if they apply early. When you research schools with the early decision option, check out the acceptance rates for students who apply early decision versus regular admission. The early decision acceptance rates are usually higher.

Have you heard of 4 or more?

Have you heard about <u>4 or More</u>[™]? It is a College Board initiative designed to inspire, assist, and reward you as you encourage all students to apply to at least four colleges. Over 5,000 of your counseling colleagues nationwide have already joined the movement and are benefiting from the tools and resources they have received.

Why should students apply to four or more colleges?

Studies show that students who apply to two colleges, rather than just one, are 40 percent more likely to enroll in college, and applying to four colleges increases the likelihood that the college they choose will be a good fit for them — academically, socially, and financially.





- 1. Students applying to a college directly **online** should notify their school counselor.
- **2.** Some college/universities will waive the applications fee if you visit their campus. Other colleges/universities have free online college applications. Students having financial difficulties covering the application fee should see their guidance counselor.
- 3. TRANSCRIPT REQUEST- CURRENT STUDENTS: Students must complete an official Western Wayne TRANSCRIPT REQUEST form giving permission to send the student's transcript and test scores. Applications are not considered complete without your transcript. TRANSCRIPT REQUEST forms are available on the Western Wayne website (under Guidance) or on the opening page under Guidance Resources.

The first request you make is **FREE**. All subsequent requests are **\$5.00**. Bring the check, money order, or cash into Mrs. Sgarlata in the guidance office. Your transcript will be sent certified. Please allow one week to process transcript requests! PLAN AHEAD.

- 4. TRANSCRIPT REQUEST- FORMER STUDENTS Please follow the instructions above. In addition, if YOU ARE A PREVIOUS STUDENT, a letter requesting the transcript must be submitted with your signature. The letter can be attached electronically with this request or sent to the Western Wayne Guidance Department, 1970A Easton Turnpike, Lake Ariel, PA 18436. The request will not be processed until the letter is received.
- **5.** Your transcript includes your SAT and ACT scores. Check to make sure guidance has your most up to date scores. A few colleges require that you have your SAT/ACT sent directly from the College Board/ACT program (Penn State is one). It is your responsibility to have the scores sent. Questions...see your guidance counselor.
- **6.** Fee waivers are available for most colleges if you received a fee waiver for the SAT or ACT. See your guidance counselor for an application fee waiver. If you are paying an application fee by check or money order, please bring it to guidance and we will attach it to your transcript. Most colleges allow you to pay by credit card when you complete

your application online. Checks and money orders must be made out to the college you are applying to. DO NOT pay for college application fees with cash!

- **7.** Students requesting Counselor Letters of Recommendation must request the letter at least **TWO WEEKS** in advance.
- 8. In most instances Early Decision applications should be submitted around November 1st. This can vary so watch your dates! Regular Decision applications should be submitted as soon as possible. If you are uncertain about application deadlines see your guidance counselor.
- **9. Mid-year grades** will be sent to colleges that require them. It is the student's responsibility to notify the guidance office about sending out midyear grades.
- **10.** Final transcripts will be sent to the college that the student will attend. **FINAL TRANSCRIPT REQUESTS** will be given to seniors at the end of the school year. *Remember, college admissions representatives review all senior year grades very carefully.*

Students and parents are encouraged to contact their School Counselor with any questions or concerns.





IF YOU HAD A CAREER AS AN O&M SPECIALIST, WHERE COULD YOU WORK?

You might work in a school, a home, or in the community.



IN A SCHOOL, you would:

- Teach students to travel safely and independently using strategies such as tactile map and long cane skills.
- Collaborate with professionals (for example, occupational and physical therapists) and family members to structure the environment to promote safe and independent travel.
- Assist students with recreational and physical education activities to promote inclusion with peers.



IN A HOME, you would:

- Motivate students to engage in purposeful movement to explore their environment.
- Help a family create routines that promote sofe and independent exploration of a student's home environment.
- Co-create plans with families for independent travel across the home, school, and community.



IN THE COMMUNITY, you would:

- Assist a student in exploring a variety of modes of transportation, such as a bus or a train.
- Show a student how to use a smart phone, magnifier, telescope, or other technology to navigate public places, such as restaurants and grocery stores.

HOW TO BECOME AN ORIENTATION & MOBILITY (0&M) SPECIALIST IN PENNSYLVANIA:

- 1. Complete a bachelor's degree.
- 2. Enroll in a university program for three to four additional semesters, which includes a practicum/internship.
- 3. Take a test to earn a credential.
- Apply for certification as a Certified Orientation and Mobility Specialist through the Academy for Certification of Vision Rehabilitation and Education Professionals (ACVREP).

IS A CAREER AS A TEACHER OF STUDENTS WITH VISUAL IMPAIRMENTS RIGHT FOR YOU?





WHAT IS A TEACHER OF STUDENTS WITH VISUAL IMPAIRMENTS (TVI)?

A TVI is an expert who teaches students to explore the world by learning how to interpret what they hear, feel, and smell. A TVI works with educational teams to enhance students' learning by adapting activities and materials. They also interact with community services in support of students and their families.

WHERE COULD YOU WORK AS A TVI?

You might work in a school, a home, or in the community.



IN A SCHOOL, you would teach students to:

- Read and write braille.
- Use technology, such as a magnifier or laptop, to access classroom materials.
- Scan a bulletin board to locate important information, such as vocabulary words and schedules.
- Roleplay conversational skills to help them talk with friends.
- Interpret tactile maps and graphs.
- Advocate for their needs and accommodations.



IN A HOME, you would assist students with:

- Identifying sounds in their environment to know what is happening around them.
- Increasing literacy skills by adapting books for the student and the family to read.
- Improving independent living skills, such as how to organize clothing and prepare meals.



IN THE COMMUNITY, you would provide students with:

- Opportunities for recreational activities with peers, such as playing basketball with a friend.
- Access to after-school activities, such as robatics and swimming.
- Guidance on career options and suggestions for possible employment opportunities.
- Assistance in locating places and things in their environment, such as their school compus or a coffee shap.

- Work with individuals of varying abilities and ages
- Work one-on-one with children
- Explore and use the latest technologies
- Collaborate with others

HOW TO BECOME A TVI IN PENNSYLVANIA:

The two most common pathways to becoming a TVI include:

OPTION 1 — Pursue a Bachelor of Science degree in Special Education/Visual Impairment through Kutztown University. Kutztown is the only PA university to focus specifically on preparing teachers of the visually impaired.

OPTION 2 — First, earn a Bachelor of Science degree in Education/Special Education from a college or university. Then, enroll in a graduate and certification program in Blindness and Visual Impairment through either Salus University or the University of Pittsburgh.

Grants and scholarships are often available for students interested in pursuing TVI certification.

GUARD SCHOLARSHIPS

The high price of tuition doesn't have to stand in the way of a great education. The Army National Guard provides financial assistance to students who wish to attend college and enlist in the Guard, with two major scholarships for full-time students: the Dedicated Army National Guard (DEDNG) scholarship and the Guaranteed Reserve Forces Duty (GRFD) contract.

To receive one of these scholarships, you must be involved in the Simultaneous Membership Program (SMP) with a National Guard unit while in school and have a letter of acceptance from a local Guard unit stating that they will accept you in an SMP status. Following graduation, cadets begin a new Military Service Obligation (MSO) contract and serve eight years in the Guard, which includes training.

DEDICATED ARMY NATIONAL GUARD (DEDNG) SCHOLARSHIP

The DEDNG scholarship is available for up to four years but does not allow simultaneous use with the Chapter 1606/MGIB-SR or Chapter 1607/REAP GI Bills. Recipients receive full tuition or full room and board (flat rate of \$10,000 per year), plus up to \$1,200 for books, and are paid a monthly stipend of \$420 for 10 months each year. In addition to a monthly allowance, they can also receive the drill pay of a sergeant, approximately \$319 per month, when they participate in the SMP.

GUARANTEED RESERVE FORCES DUTY (GRFD) SCHOLARSHIP

The GRFD scholarship is mainly for students entering their junior year of college. GRFD scholarships are available for up to two years and allow simultaneous use with the Chapter 1606/MGIB-SR or Chapter 1607/REAP GI Bills. GRFD recipients (dedicated or not) can choose either full tuition and fees or room and board (flat rate of \$10,000 per year) and receive \$1,200 for books. They are given an ROTC allowance for 10 months of the year at \$420 per month. As a member of the Guard, they will also receive drill pay. If eligible for Chapter 1606 Montgomery GI Bill (MGIB), the student may qualify for an additional \$350 per month MGIB SMP kicker.

MINUTEMAN (MM) SCHOLARSHIP

Minuteman Scholarships can be either two-year GRFD scholarships or DEDNG-GRFD scholarships that cover up to four years. They guarantee that Cadets who commission as Army officers will serve in the Guard. A Minuteman Scholarship requires a nomination letter as part of the scholarship packet and offers either full tuition and mandatory fees or a room and board flat rate of \$10,000 per year, covering up to four years (or eight semesters) of benefits. Minuteman Scholarship recipients also receive a \$1,200 annual book allowance and a monthly stipend of \$420 for 10 months of the academic year. Minuteman Scholarship Cadets must participate in the SMP while attending college, so they will also receive pay for attending a drill one weekend per month and a two-week annual training in a local Guard unit. In return for these scholarship benefits, a Minuteman Cadet will serve as a Commissioned Officer in the Guard in a drilling status for eight years after graduation.

Minuteman Scholarship Cadets can be nominated from any State Adjutant General (TAG) or any Civilian Aid to the Secretary of the Army (CASA) in lengths of two years, up to four years, for a scholarship. These scholarships are limited each year, and applications require a nomination memo with a handwritten signature from the nomination source. REQUIREMENTS

In order to qualify for these scholarships, you must:

- Be a U.S. citizen
- Be accepted to a college/university with an ROTC program
- Have a 2.5 cumulative GPA and maintain a 2.0
- As an incoming freshman, have a minimum 19 ACT or 1000 SAT to qualify for the four-year Minuteman Scholarship
- Be under 31 years of age for the entire year of commissioning
- Be a full-time student
- Complete the ROTC Basic Course requirements or Basic Combat Training
- Be medically and morally qualified
