 deadlines to submit the necessary documents to colleges (your transcript,
 letters of recommendation, etc.).
- Tell your school counselor if you apply to college... your transcript needs to be sent out. TRANSCRIPTS are sent through <u>MaiaLearning</u>. Brief Job Description

Represent clients in criminal and civil litigation and other legal proceedings, draw up legal documents, or manage or advise clients on legal transactions. May specialize in a single area or may practice broadly in many areas of law.

Education

Prospective lawyers must earn a four-year undergraduate diploma as well as a <u>Juris Doctor (J.D.) degree</u>. Attorneys commonly earn their degree from a law school accredited by the American Bar Association (ABA), but not all states and jurisdictions require this.

More Info

According to the <u>U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics</u> (BLS), lawyers make a median wage of \$135,740 per year. Attorneys employed by the federal government earn the highest median salary, clocking in at \$158,370 annually. The most lucrative states for practicing attorneys are California, Massachusetts, New York, Connecticut, and Washington, D.C. Regardless of where an attorney works, salaries vary by area of practice, years of experience and employer size.

Shorten Your Path to a College Degree. Western Wayne High School is an ONLINE TESTING SITE for CLEP!!!! What is CLEP? CLEP (College Level Examination Program) is the most widely accepted faster credit-by**examination program** in the United States today, helping students of all ages earn college degrees faster by getting credit for what they already know. By receiving a satisfactory score, you can earn from 3 to 12 college credits toward your college degree for each CLEP you take, depending on the exam subject. SAVE TIME. Get college credit for what you already know. Be rewarded for what you've learned through independent study, advanced high school courses, noncredit adult courses, or professional development. CLEP offers 33 examinations in five subject areas. The tests cover material usually taught in a two-year degree program or in the first two years of a four-year program. Exams contain mainly multiple-choice questions. College Composition and a few other exams contain other types of questions and essays. For a complete list of CLEP tests and to schedule a testing time please see Mr. Fitzsimmons in the school counseling office.

College Applications

What is **Early Action**?

Early action is the early admission program in which applying early will get you an early answer. This program usually asks students to apply by November 1 and the college responds with a decision by mid-December. However, you are not required to make your decision until the regular May reply date, giving you time to compare financial aid packages between colleges. Early action is non-binding, which means you do not have to attend the college if you are accepted. The advantage of the early action program is that you find out whether you are accepted sooner rather than later, giving you time to enjoy the last few months of your senior year without having to worry about being accepted into college.

What is **Early Decision**?

Early decision is similar to early action in that you can apply early (usually by November 1) and get an early answer from your college about acceptance (usually around mid-December). However, with early decision, there is a catch. Early decision plans are binding. This means that if you apply to a college via the early decision process, you must attend that college if accepted and offered an adequate financial aid package. Thus, you can only apply to **one** early decision school. You can, however, apply to other colleges under regular admission. If you are accepted by your early decision college, then you must withdraw all other applications. Keep in mind that early decision may not be your best option if you want to compare financial aid packages between colleges. Early decision colleges usually offer students a better chance of admission if they apply early. When you research schools with the early decision option, check out the acceptance rates for students who apply early decision versus regular admission. The early decision acceptance rates are usually higher.



Western Wayne's Procedures for Submitting College Applications

- 1. Students applying to a college should notify their school counselor.
- 2. Some college/universities will waive the applications fee if you visit their campus. Other colleges/universities have free online college applications. Students having financial difficulties covering the application fee should see their guidance counselor.
- 3. TRANSCRIPT REQUEST- CURRENT STUDENTS: Are processed through MaiaLearning. Students will request a transcript through this link: https://docs.google.com/forms/d/1HShTevVMU2dJjXd5QIEUxKLpI6SbvimEOyjm0_0C9TU/edit
- **4.** Your transcript may include your SAT and ACT scores. Many colleges have gone to "Test Optional" policies (see each college to determine if they are test optional). Check to make sure Guidance has your most up to date scores. A few colleges require that you have your SAT/ACT sent directly from the College Board/ACT program. It is your responsibility to have the scores sent. Questions...see your school counselor.
- **5.** Fee waivers are available for most colleges if you received a fee waiver for the SAT or ACT. See your school counselor for an application fee waiver.
- **6.** Students requesting counselor Letters of Recommendation must request the letter at least **TWO WEEKS** in advance.
- **7.** In most instances **Early Decision** applications should be submitted around November 1st. This can vary, so watch your dates! Regular Decision applications should be submitted as soon as possible. If you are uncertain about application deadlines see your school counselor.
- **8. Mid-year grades** will be sent to colleges that require them. It is the student's responsibility to notify the Guidance Office about sending out midyear grades.
- **9.** Final transcripts will be sent to the college that the student will attend. **FINAL TRANSCRIPT REQUESTS** will be given to seniors at the end of the school year. *Remember, college admissions* representatives review all senior year grades very carefully.

Students and parents are encouraged to contact their School Counselor with any questions or concerns.

WHAT IS PGSS?

The Pennsylvania Governor's School for the Sciences is a 5-week academic residency program for rising high school seniors in Pennsylvania. Students live on campus at Carnegie Mellon University while taking courses in math, physical and natural sciences, and computer science from university professors. Students are challenged in lectures, labs, and research projects. The program is funded through charitable donations, grants, and sponsorships. It completely free for the students – there is no tuition, and room and board are provided. For many, PGSS is a life-changing experience where they form lifelong friendships and lay the foundation for their future careers. The 2025 Program will run from June 22 – July 26.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The PGSS academic program has five components:

- Core courses | Lecture-based courses in biology, chemistry, physics, mathematics and computer science constitute a common educational experience for all PGSS students.
- Laboratory courses | Each student chooses a hands-on laboratory course in biology, chemistry, physics or computer science.
- Electives | Each student may choose up to three additional courses on various topics in STEM-related fields (topics will vary depending on specific faculty interests).
- Team research project | Each student chooses a research project, carried out cooperatively with a team of 5-6 students, under the direction of a faculty advisor.
- Guest lectures & panel discussions | Invited presentations by experts in various STEM-related fields.

FACULTY & FACILITIES

The PGSS faculty are recruited primarily from Carnegie Mellon University, and from leading institutions in the surrounding area. The PGSS program of formal instruction and team research is conducted entirely on the Pittsburgh campus of Carnegie Mellon University.

Families are responsible for cost of transportation to and from the program, personal items, and spending money. Students must commit to being in residence on the Carnegie Mellon University campus for the duration of the program.
